Christian faith is a prominent theme in these books, and her topic for us will be "The Faith of Jane Austen." While we know that Jane was a vicar's daughter and a regular church goer, and we assume that her characters, probably even her bad young men, were members in good standing of the Church of England, Jane did not use religious belief as a theme in her books. Linore will discuss what we do know of Jane's religious life, focusing on her prayers, and will include some humorous comparisons with pieces from her (unguarded) letters.



Linore Rose Burkard writes "Inspirational Romance for the Jane Austen Soul." She is the author of a Regency Trilogy from Harvest House Publishers which includes the best selling, *Before the Season Ends (12/08)*, *The House in Grosvenor Square* (04/09), and the upcoming release *The Country House Courtship (Jan. 2010)*. Austen and Vermeer both favor domestic scenes centered around women, and Marsha's method was to pair a series of Vermeer's paintings with analogous scenes from Austen's novels: a woman playing the lute for a gentleman admirer is paired with the scene in Mansfield



Park where Mary Crawford plays the harp for Edmund; a Vermeer lady reading a letter from her distant husband is compared with the scene in Persuasion where Anne reads Captain Wentworth's letter.

Besides giving a delightful talk, Marsha was a most gracious representative of the national organization and a real pleasure to meet.


JASNA AGM in Philadelphia October 9-11

This year's AGM has a particularly interesting theme: "Jane Austen's Brothers and Sisters in the City of Brotherly Love." We are accustomed to focusing on heroes and heroines, but the way Jane's characters deal with their siblings tells a great deal about them as well. Think of the behavior of the Thorpe siblings in *Northanger Abbey*, compared with that of the Tilneys or the Morelands; or compare the relationships of the Bertram versus the Price children in *Mansfield Park*. And then, of course, there are Jane's own relations with her brothers and sister to be discussed. Those who are able to attend will surely have some new viewpoints to bring to our future discussions.

Reading Group Subject for the Year is Persuasion

This year our reading group, lead by Jean Long, will study *Persuasion*, Jane's most popular novel after *Pride and Prejudice*. At 27, Anne Elliot is the oldest of Austen's heroines, and, after Fanny Price, she is the most oppressed by her family. Ten years before, she missed the chance to become a proper Austen heroine. Unsure of her own judgment, she let herself be persuaded out of an engagement to the man she loved. *Persuasion* is the story of her unexpected second chance.

As usual, our Reading Group will meet from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. on second Sundays. All meetings except the first and the last will be at Jean's home. Marilyn Rueth will host the first meeting, and the last meeting will be held in Greenville at the 18th century Stone's house.

She's Got a Brand New Boyfriend?



Jane Austen: An Unrequited Love, by Dr. Andrew Norman, proposes a new suitor for Jane. The following is from an article by Steve Peacock May 27, 2009 in the *Torquay Herald Express*.

"In his new biography, Dr Andrew Norman claims clues in letters between [Jane and Cassandra] plus other evidence point to Dr Samuel Blackall being the novelist's notorious 'nameless dateless lover' during a summer romance beside the seaside in Devon. He



believes the novelist...first met Blackall, a theology student and a fellow at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, in 1798 when he was the guest of mutual friends the Lefroys. Tom Lefroy is supposed to have been Austen's inspiration for the rugged and handsome Mr Darcy in *Pride and Prejudice*. But according to Dr Norman it was the young Blackall who had caught her eye. However, all chances of a romance fizzled out after Blackall appeared to become uncertain over the courtship. According to Dr Norman, Dr Blackall's letters to friends disclose his wish to pursue a courtship with the young author, but his uncertainty was treated as a snub by Austen. "There seems no likelihood of his coming into Hampshire this Christmas, and it is therefore most probable that our indifference will soon be mutual, unless his regard, which appeared to spring from knowing nothing of me at first, is best supported by never seeing me," she wrote to her sister Cassandra.

"Nothing else was heard until Jane and her parents went down to the South Devon coast in 1802. Here we know she met and fell in love with an unknown clergyman, who was visiting his brother who was working in the town as a doctor," said Dr Norman.... "I looked all over the place and found a Dr John Blackall registered in Totnes. He turned out to be Samuel's brother." Few of Austen's letters between 1801 and 1804 survive, making corroboration of the relationship difficult, but Dr Norman said Austen's novels and poems from around this time support the Blackall theory...

This all sounds more or less plausible, but Dr. Norman goes on to propose that Jane and Cassandra were both in love with his new-found hero and bickered about it for the rest of their lives.
