"Underpinnings & Fine Beginnings" Sunday, September 16 at Jay's

Well known local Revolutionary War period reenactor Ann Armstrong will be our first featured speaker of the 2012-13 season. She will talk about the history of undergarments ("lingerie, underpinnings, foundation garments, or just plain underwear") for ladies and gentlemen. Her talk will be illustrated using both authentic pieces and reproductions, and she will demonstrate how our ancestors got dressed in Austen's day.

A graduate of the University of Dayton in commercial design, Ann is a lifelong collector of antiques and antique clothing, as well as a member of various historical organizations. As a reenactor she has served with the First American Revolutionary War regiment. Retired from the Sinclair Community College marketing department, she also had worked for the City of Springfield information office, and WBLY radio.

Jay's Seafood Restaurant

Jay's Seafood Restaurant in the Oregon District is one of Dayton's best and most popular restaurants, particularly known for its seafood and its key lime pie (that's why we're offering the option to order dessert). Jay's also offers an interesting ambiance. It is housed in the old Dayton Corn and Grist Mill, which was built in the 1850's along the Miami-Erie Canal. The splendid bar is from the Pony House Restaurant, a popular Dayton meeting place for 85 years, between 1882 tand 1967. Buffalo Bill Cody is said to have ridden his horse right up to that bar, which was carved from 5400 pounds of Honduran mahogany.

Jay's was the site of the first JASNA Dayton meeting I ever attended—an Austen Birthday Party 18 years ago, with harp music and a talk on *Mansfield Park*. This should be another such elegant and interesting occasion.

Gary Mitchner Retires as JASNA Dayton RC

Gary Mitchner has served thirteen years as our Regional Coordinator. That is about half as long as JASNA Dayton has been in existence. (We celebrated our 25th anniversary with a Gala in

May, 2010). Over the years Gary has attended many AGMs, including the one at Winchester, at which he gave a presentation. He sponsored a Gala at Sinclair Community College, and has done much to publicize our group, including the event at Books & Co. pictured here.

Gary is an Emeritus Professor of English at Sinclair and former chair of the department, as well as having been appointed Sinclair's Poet Laureate. As a poet he regularly gives readings and

conducts poetry workshops. His works have appeared in *The Paris Review*, *The New Republic*, *Shenandoah*, *Cincinnati Review*,

and Western Humanities Review, among many other publications.

Besides JASNA Dayton, Gary volunteers for the Dayton Peace Museum, the Dayton Art Institute, the Miami Valley Hospital, Human Race Theatre, and Friendship Force. He is a docent at the Dayton Art Institute, where he gives tours in verse, and has sponsored several JASNA Dayton meetings there. At the Miami Valley Hospital he works in the Vascular and Heart Lab. He reads plays for the Human Race Theatre and reads fiction and non-fiction for the Dayton Literary Peace Prize. He is on the board of the Friendship Force Dayton Club and has traveled with them and been exchange director to Australia, New Zealand, Switzerland, England, Scotland, Russia, Estonia, and Germany, as well as taking part in many exchanges within the United States. Gary also travels regularly with the Dayton Chamber of Commerce, including trips to China, India, and Cuba.

Another of Gary's talents, which our group has often enjoyed, is his ability to put on an exemplary tea. We appreciate Gary's many years of service to our group, and we look forward to his continued participation in our activities.

Jean Long To Be New JASNA Dayton RC

Jean Long has been a serious Jane Austen fan since she was 14. Laid up with a torn ligament in her heel, she asked her mother whether there was ANYTHING in the house she hadn't read yet, and her mother replied, "Yes, there's that book your aunt sent you at Christmas—*Pride and Prejudice*." That was the start of Jean's lifelong love for Austen. Every year she re-reads all of Austen's novels, and she has collected an extensive library of Austen-related works in her home.

Jean has a long history with JASNA Dayton. She joined in the early 80's in response to a notice posted in the Oakwood Library that the group was being formed. For the past seven years she lead the very popular Reading Groups here in Dayton, an offshoot of the16 year series



she has led at her summer home in Bay View, Michigan. Fortunately, she will continue as Reading Group leader during her tenure as RC.

Jean is familiar with JASNA, too, having served on the National Board for six years. She revived and then chaired the National Essay Contest and chaired the Jane Austen Churches Committee. In 2003, she was part of the New York City group that planned and ran the AGM in Winchester. She served as the liaison between Winchester Cathedral and the conference, a job that included putting together the reception before the Jane Austen Evensong and feting the guest of honor, Princess Alexandra. Jean also helped to plan the Evensong service itself, which she describes as a challenging and moving experience, and great fun.

Jean's other great interests have included gardening and the Boy Scouts. A lifelong gardener and certified Master Gardener, Jean directed the Bay View Memorial Garden Committee for 11 years and chaired in for seven, and has volunteered at Cox Arboretum. She has taught classes in pruning and other gardening subjects and given talks to gardening clubs. Jean became involved in the Scouts when he son was a member, and came to serve 12 years on the Council Board, in addition to taking part in many camping activities and the national Jamborees.

Debra Bentley is New Membership Chair

Deb Bentley is replacing Meredith Stoehr as Membership Chair. Meredith (that is I) remains as Newletter Chair. Deb is a long-time fan of Jane Austen. She read her first Austen novel, *Emma*, while in high school. She loved it (Emma is still her favorite of Austen's novels) and so of course she read the rest. She has re-read them all, but lately has been playing the unabridged audio books on her iPod while she works in her studio. She also sometimes watches the videos, any but the Greer Garson one. That one is not faithful to the novel, she says. She also enjoys *Clueless* and Carrie Bebris' novels.

Deb has been a member of JASNA, and of JASNA Dayton since 1985, when she read an article about our group in the *Dayton Daily News*. During the two years she lived in Virginia (1994-1996), she joined the District of Columbia Region. While in Virginia, she edited a column in *JASNA News*, called "JASNA Personals." Back in Dayton, she became the Dayton Region Newsletter Editor for several years. She also served as the Dayton Regional Coordinator from about 1997-1999. She has been lucky enough to attend three JASNA AGMs: Ottawa, Canada, 1991; Lake Louise, Canada, 1993; and Richmond, VA, 1996.

After 30 years as a logistician, she retired from Wright-Patterson AFB in 2008, from the position of Director of Logistics, 303rd Reconnaissance Wing, Aeronautical Systems Center. She is now a fiber artist, making art quilts and other fiber art for exhibit. She has had quilts in several national and international shows, including Creative Statements: Ohio Art Quilts, Zanesville Museum of Art, Zanesville, OH, (2012); Sacred Threads, International, Herndon, VA (2011); and Aullwood Audubon Center Annual International Show, Dayton, OH, (2009-2012).

Writing Like Jane

Carrie's July newsletter includes a reference to an interview she did for the blog <u>www.jungleredwriters.com</u>. In the July 17 interview Hallie Ephron, whom Carrie met at the Antioch Writers' Workshop, asked what references Carrie uses to keep her style appropriate to the Regency period. Carrie referred her to a site we might find amusing: <u>writelikeausten.com</u>. You type in a word and it tells you whether that word ever appeared in Austen's works, and if so how many times



Hallie checked out the reference by going to the site and typing in "Jungle." Back came the information that Austen

never used "jungle." In place of "jungle" in recommended park (appears 158 times in Austen's novels), wood (26 times), woods (20), wilderness (10), forest (8), timber (7), mess (3), litter (3), scramble (2), bush (2), knot (1), chase (1), jumble (1), or hanger (1).
