It was a casual occasion, with plenty of opportunity for conversation as well as perusing the books, tapes (by now replaced by DVDs), and magazines (*Jane Austen's Regency World!*) on display around the house. In the last two years, the library has grown enough to justify another such meeting, as Toni has purchased the entire Cambridge edition of Austen's works and both Jean Long and Gary Mitchner have been strenuously culling their personal libraries. Interest has also developed lately in a summer Box Hill picnic. The Tumbusch property being handsome and fairly extensive, it was decided to combine the two events in one. We will picnic on the lawn, stroll

about the grounds and browse through selections from the library. We also hope to use the occasion to continue our ongoing discussion of the future of the Reading Group.

Location: 4271 North Gensen Loop, Cincinnati, OH 45245

Directions: Take your best route to I-275 East in Cincinnati. (For those in Dayton, Columbus, and other points north, this will most likely be I-75 South or I-71 South, depending on your location.)

Follow I-275 to Exit 63B (Ohio-32 toward Batavia). You'll pass Eastgate Mall (on the left) and a miniature golf course (on the right) and eventually come to a large intersection, which is Glen Este Withamsville Road.

Turn RIGHT onto Glen Este Withamsville and follow it as it snakes around, first to the right, then to the left. After these two twists, you'll pass the police station and a veterans' park. When you get to the intersection with the helicopter on your left (no joke) and the water tower on your right, you will have reached Clough Pike. Turn LEFT on Clough.

The first traffic light you come to on Clough will be Crestwood Lane. Turn RIGHT on Crestwood.




Turn LEFT on the second street you come to, which will be North Gensen Loop.

Tom and Toni's house is the first house on the left in the second block, 4271 North Gensen Loop. There's a wicker swing on the front porch.

Carrie Bebris To Speak at Our September Meeting

Our first meeting of the 2015-16 year is tentatively scheduled for Sunday, September 27 at Patterson Homestead. Carrie Bebris, our Regional Coordinator, will talk about Jane Austen's *Sanditon* and her own new book, *The Suspicion at Sanditon*. This latest entry in her Mr. and Mrs. Darcy Mysteries series will be released on July 15.



I have read an advance copy of Carrie's book, and it is great fun. Austen's *Sanditon* features members of the gentry engaged in promoting a seaside resort. Carrie takes Austen's large and eccentric cast, along Mr. and Mrs. Darcy and a few characters of her own invention, and turns them loose at a mysterious dinner party at Lady Denham's estate. With a terrible storm, picturesque ruins, secret passages, and disappearances, the story takes on a Gothic tone and a complexity reminiscent of some Agatha Christie plots. I recommend reading or rereading *Sanditon* in preparation for enjoying Mr. and Mrs. Darcy's latest adventure.

JASNA Dayton Programming Plans for 2015-16 and 2016-17

The Program Committee is introducing a couple changes in our customary program schedule, the first being the introduction of a Box Hill picnic in June. The second change is to our winter schedule. It has become so difficult to find a suitable venue for December meetings that we have decided to replace Jane Austen's birthday party with a Twelfth Night celebration in her honor. Plans are afoot for a Twelfth Night party—perhaps even a ball—at Patterson Homestead in January, 2016. For the spring 2016 meeting Amy Patterson of the Ohio North Coast Region and Jane Austen Books has agreed to present her talk "Mr. Darcy in Film," which we expect to be a big hit.

For 2016-17 we are planning a September outing to an exhibit at the Taft Museum in Cincinnati of *Downton Abbey* costumes, followed by another Twelfth Night ball in January, and a talk by JASNA President Claire Bellanti in the spring of 2017.

She is also a fine artist and videographer. Their talk gave an impressive overview of the setting for the AGM (the splendid Galt House in downtown Louisville) and the events in addition to the plenary and breakout sessions that will be available for attendees and their companions. In Defense of Mrs. Elton (A Pick from Our Region Lending Library)


From the website catalog of our Regional Lending Library (http://www.jasnadayton.org/lending-library/) I recently selected In Defense of Mrs. Elton by Diana Birchall. I had come across this title before and been intrigued by it, but I had been unable to find a copy of the book. It turned out to be a delightful little volume, privately printed by the author on fine, thick paper and exuberantly illustrated by Juliet McMaster (a prominent Canadian Austen scholar who will be a breakout speaker at the upcoming AGM.) It retells the latter part of Emma from Mrs. Elton's point of view.



In the introduction the author explains that, as a native New Yorker, she at first had trouble understanding what was supposed to be wrong with Mrs. Elton: "Yes, she was officious and inappropriate, but so were half the people I knew; so just why did everybody loathe her so?" Ms. Birchall makes the convincing point that Emma herself shares many of Mrs. Elton's faults, officiousness in particular (poor Harriet! poor Robert Martin!).

New Library Acquisition Features Austen Subplot

The JASNA Dayton library receives several Austen-related books a year from publishers. The most recent is Who Buries the Dead; a Sebastian St. Cyr Mystery by C. S. Harris. This book belongs to the Gothic-tinged Regency genre that features handsome, wealthy and fashionable noblemen who are tortured by family secrets, thwarted love, and horrors experienced during the Napoleonic Wars. Despite the hero's occasionally overwrought introspections, I enjoyed the book's lively plot and charming Austen subplot. The story takes place in 1813, with Pride and Prejudice (by the author of Sense and Sensibility) a new sensation among the ton. People describe each other in terms of



characters from the two novels. Is a suspect a Mr. Darcy or a Mr. Wickham? A Colonel Brandon? The hero's wife names her cat Mr. Darcy.

The Austens themselves are present in the book. Jane is staying in London with her brother Henry, is a suspect in the murder at hand, having been seen arguing with the victim shortly before his demise. As sister of a suspect and also a friend to the murdered man's daughter Anne, Jane Austen is able to furnish the hero with much sensible information and advice. Anne, meanwhile, plays the heroine in a *Persuasion*-like plot: her father had opposed her love for the

impoverished captain who is now a chief suspect in the murder. All together, the very un-Austen like events in the novel come to be viewed through the moral prism of Austen's world.

Who Buries the Dead also connects with the talk we heard from Crystal Lake at our December meeting. The victim is one of those Regency collectors Crystal described, possessing among many other treasures the heads of three distinguished persons. Since the lately discovered head of Charles I has just gone missing, the murder investigation necessarily involves an in-depth look at other collectors and sellers of such curiosities.

Austen films and Mini-Series Ranked

The website http://www.vulture.com/2013/08/21-jane-austen-movies-and-miniseries-



ranked.html ranks the top 20 Austen films from worst (the two versions of *Mansfield Park*) to first (Colin Firth's *Pride and Prejudice*, of course). The short reviews that accompany the ratings are spot on. The biggest surprise is *Clueless*, rated third, behind Emma Thompson's *Sense and Sensibility* and ahead of the lovely *Persuasion*. Oddly enough, all four of the topranked films appeared in 1995.
