Cincinnati-Dayton Reading Group Continues to delve in to Northanger Abbey

Judy McCoy was a generous hostess for the Reading Group on a snowy February 10, 2019, even though she recently had eye surgery and was not supposed to be too active or lift anything remotely heavy. Nine were present for the discussion lead by Kay Berg. Kay shared some of the ideas she found in "Female Quixotism Refashioned: *Northanger Abbey*, the Engaged Reader, and the Woman Writer", by Dr. Jodi Wyett, (Xavier University) which is an article in *The*

Eighteenth Century, Vol. 56, Issue 2: 2015, from the U. of PA Press. Anti-novel prejudice was so common in Jane Austen's time that she not only wrote her famous "defense of the novel" in chapter 5 of Northanger Abbey, but showed how mentor-less Catherine Morland still had novel reading to expand her horizons and understandings. Austen's defense was to support not only the readers of novels, but also the writers of them, many of whom were women. It is a mis-reading of Northanger Abbey to see the plot as a "curing" of Catherine from enjoying novels. Kay also shared a tidbit from a 1798 essay "On Reading Novels" in The Monthly Visitor and Pocket Companion which, although still part of the harangue against novel reading, admitted that it was a safer pastime for women than cards (gambling), scandal (gossip), and the toilette (vanity).

Wyett: "NA is more than a burlesque of the Gothic. Female quixotism not only signals female readers' susceptibility to print, but also the way in which such engaged reading could manifest personal transformation in surprising and often unconventional ways, thus shifting emphasis from the didactic 'cure' of a delusional woman, to the capacities of the human imagination and the fantasy of a world where various kinds of verbal and intellectual interplay can both feed a woman's mind and put food on the table--at once the most sublime and quotidian of concerns for the professional woman writer."

During the discussion, Deb Bentley, shared how Isabella Thorpe and Catherine Morland were two sides of the same coin. Catherine's mind was often in the fantasy world but her speech was always direct and true. Isabella's mind was completely worldly and her speech was always fantasy. Also, when Isabella realizes Catherine is not at all interested in marrying John Thorpe, she declares she will stand by her friend more than her brother, which may be an implied request for Catherine to stand by her when she dumps James Morland.

There was some lively discussion about Catherine's and Henry's discussion in Volume II, chapter 4 (continuous 19). It is a delightful exchange about the motives of Captain Tilney and Isabella. How much do manners, family loyalty and the fact that a single man is speaking to a single lady constrain the communication Catherine seeks? I was delighted to learn a little more about the rules of manners as taught to both Catherine and myself by Henry. But, I also wondered if there was a way he could have conveyed more information without breaking the rules. A number of times in *NA* these constraints, it seems to me, prevented Catherine from learning as much as she wanted or needed about the actions and motives of others. So, as Kay Berg presented, it really was up to Catherine, by herself, and by novel reading (and by her mistakes), to learn more about the real world.

Northanger Abbey is a short book so we plan to finish it in a single year. If you want to join us, don't wait too long, as we only have one session left. All meetings are 2:30-4:30 p.m. unless otherwise noted.

JASNA Dayton Region member and cofounder Martha Caprarotta (pen name Martha Dunsky) shares exciting news about her book *Fire and Forgiveness: A Nun's Truce with General Sherman*, published February 19 by the University of South Carolina Press. The City of Columbia, SC, and Richland School District One purchased 2,000 copies to distribute to students through their "Together We Can Read" program.

The middle-grade historical fiction tells the true story of young girls who fled a convent school during the Civil War burning of

Columbia, SC. The book's message is the importance of peacemaking. Martha launches her book in Columbia February 21 - 23 with

book signings at Mast General Store and the South Carolina State Museum, and author visits at two schools. At St. Peter's Catholic school, the "descendant" of the convent school destroyed during Columbia's burning, Martha reads part of her book to students in the adjacent cemetery, where the convent school girls hid over night during their ordeal.

Here in Ohio, Martha will sign copies of her book at the Ohioana Book Festival in downtown Columbus, on April 27. The day-long event showcasing Ohio authors will be held at Columbus Metropolitan Library's Main Library for the first time. If you can't make that event, you can join Martha on May 13 at the "Second Monday Authors" program at Woodbourne Library in Centerville.
