Northanger Abbey seems to have come and gone so quickly. It was a short book so we discussed it in four sessions instead of eight. Fourteen of us met in Eilanna Price's home on March 10, 2019. Eilanna is our Librarian, Secretary, Historian, gracious hostess and general supporting pillar of our JASNA Dayton community.

A couple of folks present for the discussion reported that *Northanger Abbey* is their second most favorite Austen book. There are so many levels or ways to view this tale: love story, gothic parody, coming of age adventure, feminist advocate, and an interesting snapshot of life over 200 years ago. Unusual for an Austen book, some readers noticed that the last quarter of the book was a page turner that one could hardly put down.

Debates arose about perceived weaknesses in this novel. How could a shallow man like General Tilney, who was obsessed with appearances, risk his reputation by being cruel to Catherine, his invited guest? Perhaps if the General believed Catherine really was low class, it did not matter how he treated her. Someone questioned the kind of intimacy over a period of many weeks that could have occurred between Catherine and Eleanor, if the latter never once mentioned having a boyfriend or man that interested her? Perhaps Eleanor's running of the household kept her from

Catherine's company most of the time, so the reader-perceived intimacy did not have time to flower. Finally, how was Austen inclining us to judge on the question of whether the Morlands were good parents or neglectful? Regardless of how we answered these questions, it is my belief that a good time was had by all. I know that was true for me.

This summer we plan to read and discuss *Eligible* by Curtis Sittenfeld in a single session, on August 11th. This is a modern retelling of *Pride and Prejudice* set in Cincinnati. Next fall we plan to begin *Persuasion*. It is also a short book, and we plan to finish it in four sessions.
